80	an annual convention schedule. Switching back to a biennial convention schedule would mitigate the impact of annual convention expenses and would also allow the reallocation of organizational resources					
81	to programming and advocacy at the district and national levels of JACL.					
82	Our annual conventi	ons have underperformed in their intended fundr	aising funct	tion since our switch to an		
83	annual convention schedule and have shown to exceed budgeted expenditures in some years. The					
84	rationale of having an annual convention in order to attract sponsors who prefer annually recurring					
85	sponsorship opportunities has not yielded significantly increased outside fiscal support and partnerships					
86	for the national organization. Most recent conventions have not met its \$150,000 goal for sponsorships. <sup>1</sup>					
87 88	Staff has been exceptionally impacted by annual conventions. Over the past few years there are fewer staff_members to spread the workload. <sup>2</sup> In the past 10 years, JACL has lost annual revenue of \$395,800 to					
89	our general operating revenue due to loss in membership. <sup>3</sup>

- Additionally, our annual convention schedule has doubled the financial burden on chapters that offset
- 91 costs for their delegates and other convention attendees. The annual convention schedule has become an
- 92 increasingly prohibitive cost for smaller chapters, forcing a decision to send fewer delegates or using a
- proxy for representation instead. Less participant attendance and more proxy representation results in
- lower fees and registration revenue. When hotel booking minimums are not met, unexpected expenses
- 95 are incurred to meet the hotel contract.<sup>4</sup>
- 96 Concerns regarding major sponsors preferring to fund annually recurring events with national reach and
- 97 visibility may in part be addressed by approaching sponsors with the possibility of extending their support
- 98 to National JACL's participation in regional programs and activities that are held in years between
- 99 biennial national conventions. Staff hours in years without a national convention would need to be
- allocated to programs and functions of the organization that would generate a comparable amount of
- revenue to make up for the fiscal impact of the resulting adjustment to staffing and operations.
- National conventions have been increasingly ineffective in serving as an opportunity to promote the
- engagement of the JACL's broader membership. JACL's uncertain finances have led to a decline in the
- programming offered at national conventions, leaving very little incentive for members who are not
- National Council delegates to attend. A biennial convention schedule would reopen programming
- opportunities such as a young professional conference or regional convenings such as the
- 107 CCDC/NCWNP/PSW Tri-District PNW/IDC Bi-District and other multi-district conferences that were
- previously held in odd-numbered years prior to the adoption of an annual convention schedule. Districts
- would need to take on the challenge of creation of more local conferences with the assistance of National
- 110 JACL to engage district members.
- Annual conventions also greatly impact how JACL's staff resources are committed. In the months leading
- to convention, staff are required to adjust their focus away from administrative, programming and
- advocacy functions and allocate a large amount of their time to working on conventions. Staff is allotted
- 114 850 hours for convention planning and over an 8 year average has dedicated 1500+ hours for convention
- planning. 5 650 staff hours have to be diverted from other programs in order to fulfill the needs for
- 116 convention. The organization has moved away from its reliance on host chapters to coordinate
- 117 conventions in some years, increasing the workload of staff and interns to produce national conventions.
- 118 Convention requires the additional expense of hiring an event planning team to help oversee convention
- logistics. Return to a biennial convention schedule would also allow for a better use of organizational
- resources to conduct and offer programming opportunities to a broader number of constituents as well as
- to pursue our organization's civil rights advocacy mission.
- Finally, concerns as to how the organization will be able to address emergent situations on the odd year
- when conventions are not held are no different than the rest of the year of any annual convention. The
- National JACL Board meets quarterly and have the benefit of technology to conduct conference calls to
- address emergent situations. Staff and National Board will continue to follow the precedent resolutions
- passed in previous conventions, as well as, utilize the strategic plan to guide their decisions. Each chapter
- can convey their concerns to their District Governor who represents them at any National Board meeting
- at any time of the year.
